



**FROM THE DESK OF  
RABBI RICHARD KLEIN**

As I write (can one use that word when employing a word processor?) these words, a cease-fire between Israel and Hezbollah has just begun. It's effectiveness and longevity remain to be seen. What is clear at the moment is that the recriminations in Israel have begun full-force. Some, of course, are politically motivated "I told you sos" from the opponents of the current government's policy of Disengagement. Many, however, are an expression of deep concern in the wake of the disappointing outcome of the conflict. Most Israelis, leadership included, apparently underestimated the enemy's resilience and underestimated the Israel Defense Forces' ability to root out Hezbollah strongholds and weapons caches.

There was, however, good news as well. The outpouring of support from Israelis not directly affected by terrorist rockets extended to their northern neighbors crossed all social and political divisions. Financial support from non-Israeli Jewish communities for the relief effort for the Israelis displaced or with their lives totally disrupted was remarkable and swift. Political support, including the gathering at the Jewish Federation of New Hampshire was impressive. Above all, it was a "wake up call" to us all that we cannot take Israel's survival for granted.

It is unfortunate that it often takes a traumatic event to provide us with our "wake up call," to remind us of what is really important to us in life. Judaism, since biblical times, has tried to give us that reminder in a more gentle manner. *S'lichot*, *Rosh Hashanah*, *Yom Kippur* and the *shofar* is intended to be our "wake up call" each autumn. Need it take an illness

**S'LICHOT**

The *S'lichot* service opens the season of the High Holy Days. This nighttime service marks the first time that the prayers and the music of the season appear. The service serves as a kick-off to weeks of preparation and work on the process of atonement.

For the seventh year the Reform congregations of central New Hampshire are gathering together for a joint service. This year the service will be held at Etz Hayim Synagogue, 1 Hood Road, Derry, NH, on Saturday, September 16, at 8:00pm. The evening begins with a panel discussion led by the rabbis of the four congregations, with refreshments and service following.

The theme of the discussion is "Preparing For the Day of Atonement" and features reflections on the history and practice of atonement. Rabbi Joshua Segal, Congregation Betenu, will address the question of "Fasting – Aide or Hindrance." Rabbi Richard Klein, Temple Beth Jacob, will examine the history of the observance of *Yom Kippur*. Rabbi Beth Davidson, Temple Adath Yeshurun, will consider the issues of how to effect atonement or ask for forgiveness. Rabbi Louis Rieser, Etz Hayim Synagogue, will explore whether there are unforgivable sins.

THE PRESIDENT**

As I sit down to write this article for the September bulletin it is still the middle of August and I don't feel as though the High Holy Days are just around the corner – but they are. By the time you get this Bulletin, you will already have received mailings from us about the High Holy Days and the start of the New Year. One of the mailings includes some "new" forms; actually we have revised the pledge form and renamed it the Annual Membership Renewal Form to more accurately reflect what it is. We hope you find that this form is more user-friendly and that it makes the annual dues process simpler and more efficient. We have also included a Data Information Sheet for each family which sets out the basic information we have on record such as phone numbers, e-mail addresses, *yahrzeit* dates, etc. We have included it so that you can make any needed corrections and updates; when this form is returned to the office we will update our records.

One of the items that I ask you to pay close attention to is your e-mail address; this is a piece of information that changes more frequently than phone numbers or home addresses. As more of our congregation has gone on-line, we have begun to use e-mail more and more to let everyone know about important upcoming events and happenings at TBJ. However, we try not to overuse it; we do not want to be considered "spam." We have received positive feedback from members who appreciate getting timely information in this way; I hope you all feel that way. However, the system is only effective if we have

The Adult Discussion Group will begin the new year by reading *The Structure of Religion: Judaism and Christianity*, by Rabbi William J. Leffler and Paul H. Jones. Bill Leffler is a former Rabbi of Temple Beth Jacob and has agreed to participate in our discussion. This will take place on Sunday, October 15 at 1:00pm. The Adult Education Committee will prepare a lunch. The location will be announced later, depending in part on how many people are expecting to take part.

(Publishers description of the book) The differences between religions, not the similarities, are often the source of confusion in inter-religious discussions. *The Structure of Religion: Judaism and Christianity*, written by Rabbi William J. Leffler, a member of Congregation Bet Ha’am and Paul H. Jones, a Professor of Religion at Transylvania University in Kentucky, presents both religions through their specific structures, each of which leads to many different manifestations between them. These structures clarify why Christianity is evangelical and Judaism is not, why Jews relate to Israel in the first person and Christians often don’t understand, why there are Jewish cook books and no Christian ones, how there can be secular Jews, and many other differences which are often difficult to explain. The book also contains a section of questions that Christians are apt to ask Jews and that Jews are apt to ask Christians. It is a book that clarifies both religions in ways not presented heretofore.

The book will be available for purchase at Gibsons Book Store on Main Street in Concord.
